Nous is evaluating the Helping Regional Communities Prepare for Drought (HRCPD) Initiative, of which the CIP is one element

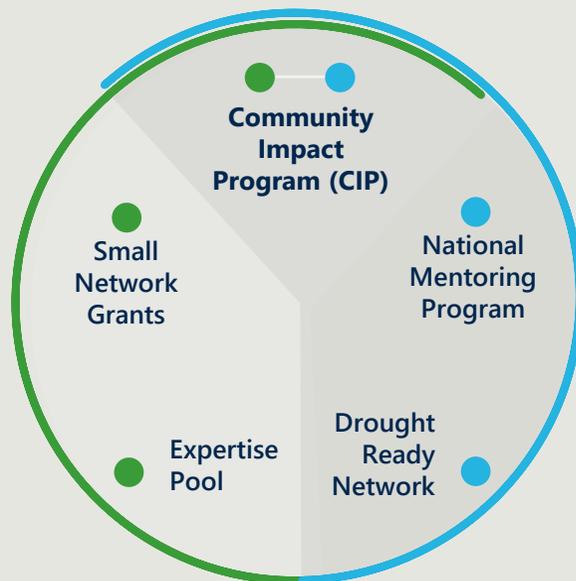
The HRCPD Initiative consist of five elements:



\$19,643,570 investment



\$10,000,000 investment



The evaluation will seek to address the following question:

To what extent and how has the HRCPD initiative enabled rural, regional and remote communities to prepare for future droughts through strengthened social resilience, local capacity and capability building?

In answering this question, the evaluation aims to:

- Capture compelling stories of impact of the HRCPD Initiative on improving social capital and resilience in rural, regional and remote communities
- Provide an evidence base on how the Initiative has enabled more drought resilient communities
- Help FRRR, ARLF and DAFF refine and adaptive the Initiative's design and delivery
- Equip local organisations with practical skills to assess, communicate and improve the impact of projects long-term.
- Inform the Future Drought Fund and related programs and reviews, and future drought policy in Australia.

The Evaluation will occur over two and half years, with the final Evaluation report due September 2025

Nous has conducted 26 evaluation working sessions with funded regions of the CIP

Thank you for providing feedback to Nous during these sessions. Your feedback will help the evaluation accurately capture the impact of your individual projects within the overall evaluation. Some participants suggested updates to four of the short-term outcomes improve clarity and be more inclusive of the full range of projects. Nous has responded to this feedback by making minor wording changes to the four identified short-term outcomes (see page 6).

Nous has made updates to four HRCPD Initiative short-term outcomes based on feedback from CIP delivery organisations

The Evaluation has identified seven short-term outcomes, building from the outcomes identified in your project roadmaps. The seven outcomes incorporate the program outcomes listed in your original project roadmap, project outcomes observed in the earlier stages of the HRCPD Initiative, project outcomes achieved by other FDF programs and the outcomes that are likely to be achieved based on a literature review of community resilience funding.

Your project reporting aligns with the short-term outcomes. The questions in the final completion reports for your CIP grants align to the seven outcomes. You will report on the 1-2 main outcomes, and any secondary outcomes, for your project.

Nous used the program logic model and data collection plans to provide impact reporting guidance

1. Program logic models support you to identify the primary outcomes your project will contribute towards

During the evaluation working session, you may have developed a program logic model for your project. Nous provided a page with guidance on the survey, interview or case study questions you might choose to ask participants of your projects for each of the outcomes you selected from the program logic model. 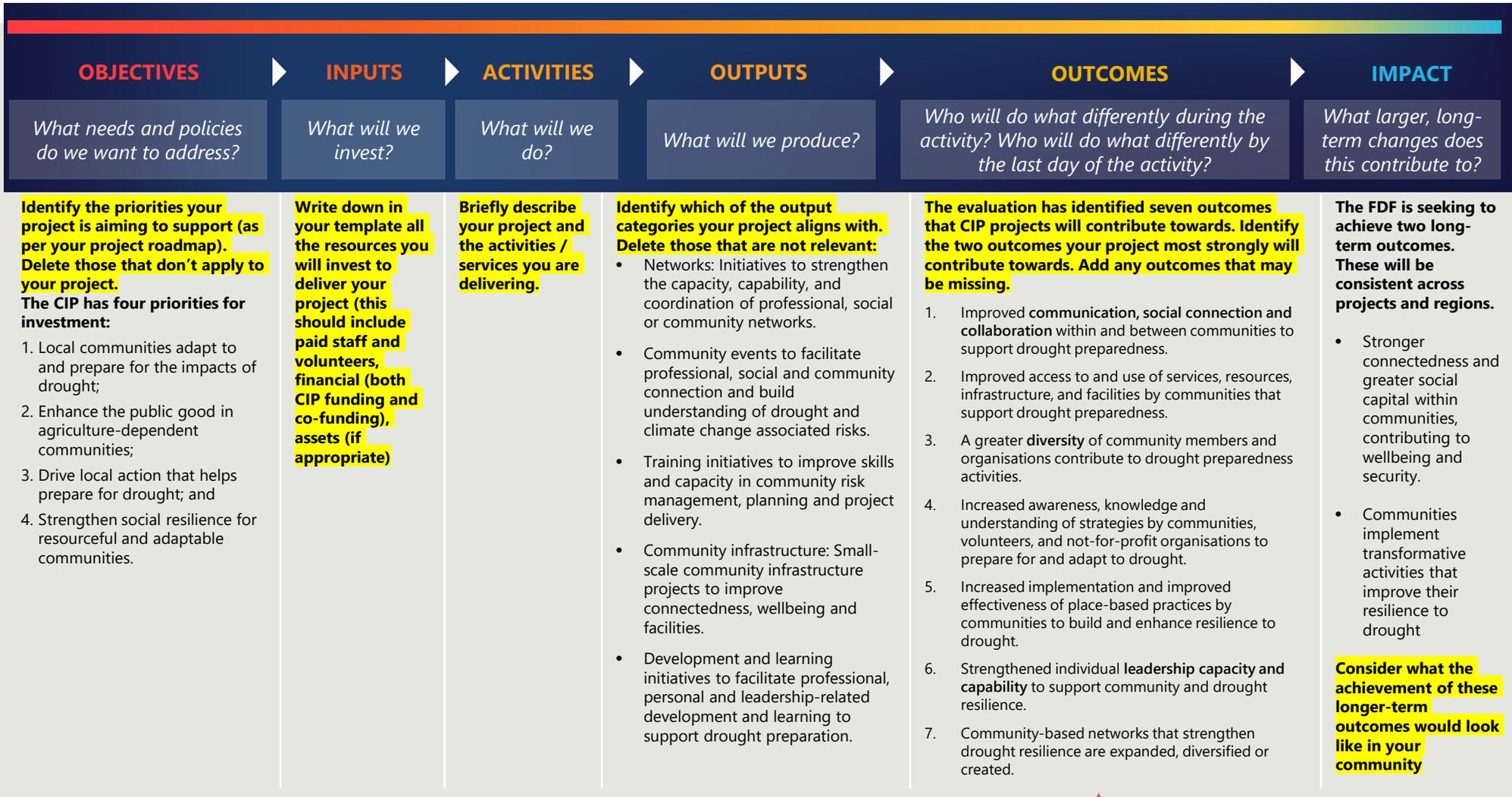
